



# CHRISTMAS CARDS COMMUNITY PROJECT

This delightful Christmas card designed by *Manahil in 8E* was selected for a very special community project. RBKares asked us if we would like to be involved in their 'Warmer in Winter' project. RBKares, a local charity have been busy preparing gift bags for the vulnerable residents in care homes in our borough and asked us if we would like to get involved by making and writing them a Christmas card. Minahil's illustration of a Tolworth Girl student at Christmas seemed perfect for this project. 200 cards have been printed and Year 8 have each written a festive message to be received by a care resident in the borough.

# SOCIALLY CONSCIOUS VESSELS A BODY OF WORK BY YEAR 8

In this last term Year 8 have been looking at telling a story through ceramics. They took initial inspiration from the Willow Pattern, an 18th century tableware design which tells an ancient fairy tale through its imagery. Year 8 have learnt how artist Paul Scott subverts traditional tableware decoration to highlight issues that matter to him and have replicated this process in their own work. The vessel form and personal themes in Grayson Perrys work influenced many to carefully consider a meaningful topic.

Students have produced designs highlighting issues which matter to them including the war in Ukraine, the loss of bees from our environment, the flooding of Pakistan, global warming, female rights in America and Black Lives Matter. What fabulous, conscientious Year 8s we have!

'I learnt a lot of things during the trip. I learnt that one catalase molecule can break down 200,000 molecules of hydrogen peroxide every second and I learnt all about the Archimedes Principle'.

'I had a wonderful time at Hampton, learning about the different sciences and doing different experiments. The sessions were fun and engaging and the many experiments helped explain a lot of difficult things making them easier to understand. I also made some new friends which was nice. Overall, I had a great day, and I would love to do something like this again!'

Twenty-five Year 12 and Year 13 Biology students visited the Dominion Theatre for the Biology Live! event on Friday 18 November 2022. During the course of the day, they heard from five prominent scientists, Professor Sarah-Jayne Blakemore, Professor Lord Robert Winston, Professor Jonathan Van-Tam, Doctor Adam Rutherford and Professor Alice Roberts, each of whom spoke about an area of cutting-edge scientific research. 
# EVENTS FOR ALL YEAR GROUPS

### YEAR 9, 10 & 11 PHOTOGRAPHY CLUB

Students have been exploring ways to create photographic imagery with and without using a camera. Students have been experimenting both in the darkroom using wet techniques to develop imagery as well as digitally.

We have created photograms to varying scales, making paper negative images of exterior scenes using slow shutter speeds with pinhole cameras, then developing them into paper positive prints. We have also continued exploring slow shutter speeds using a digital camera, capturing light trails through the lens.

Students have enjoyed exploring a range of photographic techniques and look forward to experimenting with projection and crystal ball photography next!



# KINGSTON ARTS SOCIETY - YEAR 13 & YEAR 11 ART AT KINGSTON STATION



We were approached by Kingston Arts Society at the beginning of term about displaying some of our student's artwork at Kingston railway station as part of a national Arts Society scheme. We jumped at the chance to celebrate and share the work of our talented art students with the general public. Our small showcase includes four portrait studies made by GCSE Art students Jenny, Sophia, Isabella and Katie responding to the theme of identity. Inspiration came from a range of artists studied through the year leading to students devising their own designs.

Ella was fascinated by the packed streets of central London after being isolated in lockdown for so long; inspiring her to layer imagery to communicate the complex weave of people navigating the space. Lottie explored a range of digital manipulation techniques to intertwine an intriguing photographic design. Leah's mixed media textile work reflects the power of the BLM movement and the marches that took place across the world in 2021. Scarlett's powerful figure painting (the original is 5ft x 8ft) speaks of the weight and exhaustion of physical and mental disabilities.

# HEALTH AND SAFETY REMINDER FROM THE SCIENCE DEPARTMENT

All students in the laboratory must wear safety goggles. This includes when a student across the lab is still working on their practical task and you have finished your experiment for the day. This simple precaution can eliminate the danger of eye injury caused by you or your neighbour spattering chemicals or breaking glass. Another important protection for your eyes is to avoid rubbing your fingers in or near your eyes. Chemicals can easily be transferred from your hands to your eyes in this way. All students are required to wear a lab coat at all times when anyone is working with chemicals in the lab. A lab coat is more than a uniform identifying you as a scientist; it affords you some protection from spills of hot or corrosive materials as well as protecting your school uniform.


